Principal's Message:

We are very excited to celebrate Halloween on Monday October 31st.

While you are working alongside your child(ren) to determine what would make the best costume, please keep in mind to choose costumes that are respectful and do not borrow something from someone's culture; as defined below:

'Cultural appropriation is the taking or borrowing of something from someone else's culture without their permission and/or without understanding its significance. While wearing someone else's cultural attire is not always cultural appropriation, wearing it as a costume is.'

Unfortunately, shelves of many stores will stock costumes that have inappropriate aspects of many different cultures. Costumes should not become opportunities to turn a person's identity into a stereotyped image. Some examples of inappropriate costumes are:

- Indigenous costumes with headdresses or feathers, fringes, fake suede, and braids
- "Arab Sheikh" outfits with the sinister mustaches
- "Mexican" costumes: wide sombreros, ponchos, handlebar mustaches.
- Disney costumes such as Jasmine, Mulan, Pocohontas, and Coco are not great Halloween costumes.
- Any costume that portrays a narrow or negative stereotype about a specific ethnicity, religion or race.

You can use Halloween as an opportunity to build their sociocultural competence. Here are a few discussion points you can address with them.

- Is there a history of discrimination against this identity group?
- Does my action perpetuate negative stereotypes?
- Am I depicting the culture incorrectly?
- Am I using someone else's cultural or religious symbols out of context?
- Does this offend anyone from the cultural group of origin?

The costumes worn at school may have to be slightly different than the costumes worn on the evening of the 31st. Please keep in mind we have very young children at the school (some are still just 4 years old) and we do not want to scare anyone. For this reason, we also ask that costumes being worn at school do not include:

- Masks
- Weapons of any kind (swords, knives, axes, spears, etc.)
- No graphic gore / fake blood.

Being proactive can help all of us to avoid uncomfortable situations at school and can help us ensure that Halloween is a time where all students feel safe and honored.

We will be hosting our first annual Halloween Parade outside, first thing in the morning of the Monday 31st. Stay tuned for more details.
